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HOME BASED BUSINESSES

What is a home based business?

Home based businesses include Home Office, Home Occupation, Home Business and Home Store. These are all types of businesses which can operate from a residence, subject to meeting specific definitions. Each type of land use is defined within the City's Local Planning Scheme No. 2 and is provided below.

Home Office

Home Office means a dwelling used by an occupier of the dwelling to carry out a home-based business if the carrying out of the occupation:

- is solely within the dwelling;
- does not entail clients or customers travelling to and from the dwelling;
- does not involve the display of a sign on the premises; and
- does not require any change to the external appearance of the dwelling.

A home office does not require development approval.

Home Occupation

Home occupation means a dwelling or land around a dwelling used by an occupier of the dwelling to carry out an occupation if the carrying out of the occupation:

- does not employ a person who is not a member of the occupier's household;
- will not cause injury to or adversely affect the amenity of the neighbourhood;
- does not occupy an area greater than 20m2;
- does not involve the display on the premises of a sign with an area exceeding 0.2m²;
- does not involve the retail sale, display or hire of goods unless the sale, display or hire is done only by means of the Internet;
- does not:
 - o require a greater number of parking spaces than normally required for a single dwelling; or
 - o result in an increase in traffic volume in the neighbourhood; and
- does not involve the presence, use or calling of a vehicle of more than 4.5 tonnes tare weight;
- does not include provision for the fuelling, repair or maintenance of motor vehicles; and
- does not involve the use of an essential service that is greater that the use normally required in the zone in which the dwelling is located.

A home occupation does not require development approval.

Home Business and Store

A home business means a dwelling or land around a dwelling used by an occupier of the dwelling to carry out a business, service or profession if the carrying out of the business, service or profession:

- does not involve employing more than 2 people who are not members of the occupier's household;
- will not cause injury to or adversely affect the amenity of the neighbourhood;
- does not occupy an area greater than 50m2;
- does not involve the retail sale, display or hire of any goods unless the sale, display or hire is done only by means of the Internet:
- does not result in traffic difficulties as a result of the inadequacy of parking or an increase in traffic volumes in the neighbourhood;
- does not involve the presence, use or calling of a vehicle of more than 4.5 tonnes tare weight; and

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• does not involve the use of an essential service that is greater than the use normally required in the zone in which the dwelling is located.

A home store means a shop attached to a dwelling that:

- has a net lettable area not exceeding 100m2; and
- is operated by a person residing in the dwelling.

All home businesses and stores require development approval and advertising for a minimum of two weeks (in accordance with the City's Stakeholder and Community Engagement Policy) prior to the commencement of use.

The following information is required to be submitted with the development application:

- Development application form;
- Applicable fee (refer to Fees and Charges Schedule available on the City's website);
- A site and floor plan of dwelling showing the area to be used for the Home Store and Business, including parking/access and signage; and
- A written description of the business, including operating hours, expected customers, business operations and a
 response to the above points to show how the use complies with the relevant home-based business definition as
 well as the general requirements contained in this information sheet.

What if I do not meet the requirements specified above?

Where a proposal does not satisfy any of the above requirements, development approval is required. All information identified above is required for the City's consideration of the proposal. The City would consider the proposal against the objectives of the zone as provided within the City's Local Planning Scheme.

It is important to note that any home-based business should generally operate in a way that is indistinguishable to the normal operations of the dwelling. This is required to balance supporting limited home-based business with the amenity of residents.

General Requirements

All home based businesses are required to operate in a way which makes them indistinguishable from the operations of the residence where they are located.

They are subject to the following general principles:

- does not adversely impact the amenity of the neighbourhood and residential street through light emissions, noise, vibrations, dust, waste or odour;
- does not result in increased on street parking due to the lack of sufficient parking on site;
- does not involve on site motor vehicle repairs/maintenance or refueling;
- does not require modifications to the structure of the dwelling which would impact the residential character of the dwelling;
- does not involve deliveries outside of normal business hours of 8am to 5pm, Monday Friday; and
- does not involve any operation which is involved with the penetration of skin (tattoo parlour, body piercing and electrolysis).

Do I need to pay any fees?

If development approval is required prior to the commencement of the use, a fee is required. The applicable fee is provided within Fees and Charges Schedule provided on the <u>City's website</u>.

How long does the planning approval process take?

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The City has 60 days in which to determine the application or 90 days if the application requires community consultation. Clause 75(c) of the Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulation 2015 states that applications may take longer than 90 days where it is agreed to in writing between the local government and the applicant.

What information is required for a Development Application?

Please refer to the <u>Change of Use</u> Checklist.

Do I require any other approvals from the City?

Unless any works are proposed (i.e. changes to the structure of a building), a building permit is not required for any home business, home occupation, home store or home office applications.

An occupancy permit is not required for any home business, home occupation, home store or home office applications within a single house or grouped dwelling development. However, an occupancy permit may be required for home business, home occupation, home store or home office applications within a multiple dwelling (apartment)

If your business involves penetration of the skin (for example, waxing, eyebrow or nail services); or involves the storage, handling or packing of food, approval may be needed from the City's Health team. Do you have any more questions?

The City is unable to confirm if a proposal would be supported in the absence of a formal development application. However, applicants can discuss planning proposals and preliminary plans with the City's Urban Planners. Urban Planners can provide general advice to applicants on a proposed development or land use and the information required to lodge a complete application.
