#### Introduction

The City of Vincent has a well established role and positive history in promoting safety and crime prevention, since starting its Safer Vincent Program in 1998. The City subsequently entered into a formal partnership with the State Government, Office of Crime prevention in 2005 and developed the City's first strategic safety and crime prevention plan in 2007.


In 2009 the City's comprehensive Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership (SVCPP) conducted a logo competition by inviting children in years 4 to 7 from all primary schools within Vincent to design a logo depicting their vision of a "Safer Vincent". Elements depicted in the logo were safety, unity, harmony, diverse community, working together, partnerships between the community, Police, the City and businesses and also positive aspects of living within Vincent. The new logo will be used for all future Safer Vincent and Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership activities.



Whilst the City continues to play a key development role and contribution to supporting crime prevention, the title of the this current plan has been changed to "The Safer Vincent Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan 2011-2014" to more accurately reflect the 'whole of partnership' role in implementing the actions of this plan.

The Safer Vincent Community Safety and Crime Prevention Plan 2011-2014 builds on the foundations and lessons learnt from the then "Town of Vincent Community Safety Crime Prevention Plan 2007-2010" which has now been successfully implemented. The updated plan has a changed format, to become a more succinct version, with some actions from the previous plan now dropping away as they have been completed or having had allocated resources fully expended. The new plan contains ongoing and new actions which are listed in Safer Vincent Priority and action areas. All actions have been mapped under consolidated and refined priority areas as per current established community need and perceptions established from


community consultations and community crime profile data.

#### Community profile


This plan has been developed utilising the Office of Crime Prevention (Community Safety and Crime Prevention Profile City of Vincent 2008–09) to inform strategic planning and resource allocation on crime prevention within the City.

The City of Vincent is a busy and centrally located local government within the metropolitan area of Perth. Covering 11.3km in area, the City incorporates all or part of the suburbs of North Perth, Highgate, Mount Hawthorn, Leederville, East Perth, West Perth, Perth and Mount Lawley. Within these areas the City has substantial features including convenient public transport, beautiful parks, amenities, sporting and community facilities, entertainment precincts and significant cultural diversity. Vincent's centrally located position and cosmopolitan feel, adds to its appeal and allure for

residents, businesses and visitors alike. By all indications the City is also a safer place in which to live, visit and work.

According to the Community Safety and Crime Prevention Profile City of Vincent 2008–09 Office of Crime Prevention, Since 1999-2000, the City of Vincent has recorded lower crime rates than the Central Metropolitan SSD across all offence categories, with the exception of residential burglaries from 1999-2000 to 2001-02 and in 2004-05. The City recorded lower rates of offences against the person, non-residential burglaries and property damage than the state over the period. Offence rates for residential burglaries, non-residential burglaries and motor vehicle theft in the City have been declining over the ten-year period, in line with state-wide trends.

In Vincent, a total of 3,276 offences were recorded in 2008-09, 57 offences or 1.7% fewer than in 2007-08. The most commonly recorded offences were other theft (i.e. other than motor vehicle) with 30.3% of the total, property damage (14.5%) and residential burglary (8.8%).





#### Community profile cont'd

In 2008-09, domestic assaults made up 22.6% of assaults recorded in Vincent. More than half (51.3%) of assaults in the City were alcohol related. In comparison, domestic assaults accounted for 37.5% of assaults in Western Australia and alcohol was a factor in 44.7% of assaults in the state.

Rates of recorded crime in Vincent were lower across all selected offence categories in 2008-09 than in the Central Metropolitan SSD and Western Australia. Offences recording the highest rates were other theft (32.1 offences per 1,000 residents), property damage (14.4) and acts intended to cause injury (7.5).

In 2008-09, Vincent recorded an overall decrease of 1.7% in reported offences. Of the selected offences, the largest percentage falls were in dealing or trafficking in illicit drugs, which fell 31.3% (from 16 offences to 11) and possession or use of illicit drugs, down 14.3% (from 166 to 144). Offences which increased were residential burglaries (up 17.6% or 43 offences) and offences against the person (up 1.2% or 4 offences).

#### Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership (SVCPP)

The City facilitates the Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership (SVCPP), of which the City, WA Police and community representatives are all active participants, working collaboratively to deal with community safety and crime prevention concerns. The City's SVCPP has evolved to achieve a diverse representation reflective of the Vincent Community with representatives from areas including;

#### Stakeholders Consulted

A Crime Prevention Review Plan Workshop in conjunction with Office of Crime Prevention and WA Police was held Thursday 27 May 2010, attended by City elected members and staff, residents, SVCPP members, local police, precinct group members, and stakeholder organisation representatives. This workshop, combined with analysis of Community Safety and Crime Prevention Profile data, formed the basis for development of this plan and its priorities. The workshop gave an overview of previous safety plan, Safer Vincent, achievements and projects completed. An overview was given from WA Police perspective of City of Vincent area and district priorities covered by Perth/Wembley and Bayswater Police Stations.



#### Stakeholders Consulted cont'd

The workshop items for discussion, identified community safety prevention priorities for the Partnership and current crime and anti-social activity. A process to monitor and evaluate crime prevention, discuss initiatives and strategies was also explored.

In opening the Crime Prevention Review Plan Workshop, Mayor Nick Catania stated;

I encourage all those attending today, in your respective roles, to ensure that your agencies have supportive policy environments to implement the Community Safety goals that will be developed.

I also encourage all Agencies and Representatives to be open and to support solutions that go to the roots of the problems and help develop bold and new solutions to existing problems. If strategies haven't worked in the past let's acknowledge this and look to new innovative strategies and continue to support the common goal of us all – making our community safer.

The results for review process and the issues identified were initially prioritised in order of perception of issues and needs as above. These priorities have been then incorporated into five strategy areas. The strategies have been developed to address current crime profile data and community concerns indentified in the review plan Workshop.



#### **Strategy Focus**

#### Strategy 1- Promoting community awareness and understanding of safety and crime prevention in the City of Vincent

The City acknowledges the importance of the community being aware of safety issues within the environment and practical steps that can reduce or discourage crime. To equip the community and deter opportunities for crime, this strategy focus area has an emphasis on community education and developing local resources on safety and crime prevention.

#### Strategy 2- Working together in partnership with key stakeholders to plan and implement community safety initiatives

Safety and crime prevention within the City has historically been founded in recognition that key gains in safety and reduction in crime, is best achieved in strategic partnership with key stakeholders. Contemporary approaches to crime prevention contend that the role is not just relegated to Police, but is the responsibility of the whole community working together. This strategy focus is on building and complementing ongoing and key relationships in safety and crime prevention.

#### Strategy 3- Contribute to and promote safe physical environments

Safe physical environments in which people feel safe, encourage active and healthy participation in the community and elicit further positive use of the of public spaces, resulting in increased commerce and tangible social benefit. This strategy focuses on developing and maintaining a welcoming environment and includes Designing Out Crime Strategies (DOC) along with other proactive strategies to counter and reduce anti social behaviour.

#### Strategy 4- Promote community capacity building in regards to community safety across Vincent's diverse community

The City celebrates its diversity and cosmopolitan areas which add to the City's richness and appeal. This strategy encompasses actions that further acknowledge this diversity and seeks participation of diverse stakeholders in assisting the community and SVCPP in building the City as a safer and desirable place for all.

#### Strategy 5- Enhance and promote Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership, this plan, actions, goal

WA Police - OCP Crime Prevention Profiles completed for local governments areas, support evidence that the City is a safer place to live, visit and to recreate. Despite this, not always positive perceptions of safety or crime prevail in the media or in the broader communities' perception. This area aims at focusing on promoting positive aspects of safety, living and enjoying the facilities within the City of Vincent, supported by the key underpinning actions of the combined Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership stakeholders, who work and strive to make the City a safer place.

Justification for Services/ Rationale	This initiative has been developed by the Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership, with the support of the Central Metropolitan Crime Prevention Unit, in close conjunction with local Police Stations, and will be used to target priority offences;  • Residential Burglaries through unlocked doors and windows • Theft of and from Motor vehicles (including scooters);  Offence statistics justify such a local initiative; In Vincent, a total of 3,276 offences were recorded in 2008-09, 57 offences (1.7%) fewer than in 2007-08. The most commonly recorded offences were other theft (i.e. other than motor vehicle) with 30.3% of the total, property damage (13.5%) and residential burglary (8.8%).

### Management Structure

It is hoped that the dissemination of a handy key light torch, imprinted with the message 'have you locked up?', distributed with a letter, will give residents in higher risk areas, tips on securing their homes and vehicles, provide an ongoing visual cue /mental note and reminder to be proactive in securing their own property. Cable locks will be distributed on referral by WA Police to local scooter/bike users, or upon application to the City of Vincent.

#### **Activities**

 Purchase of 10,000 practical and long lasting key ring torches with imprinted message simply stating 'have you locked up' and small logo.



- Strategic distribution of 8,000 of these key ring torches with an accompanying letter outlining security tips for the home and security tips for the car, directly to mailboxes within Vincent, in areas identified as vulnerable or at higher risk
- 2000 key ring torches and letter packages to be distributed between the City and WA Police for giving to residents, in cocooning areas, on request, on complaint or enquiry on securing home strategies
- Purchase of 50x Cable Locks for securing scooters
- Minimum of 2x Media releases 1 x media release to promote/highlight to residents the importance of securing homes and 1x media release to highlight securing of vehicles, including scooters/motorbikes with an offer of cable locks
- Minimum of 1x advertisement in City newspaper promoting importance of locking up doors and securing property

#### Management

 Michael Wood, Coordinator Safer Vincent will be key project manager. WA Police Crime Prevention Unit with the Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership will be regularly provided reports on key implementation steps and milestones

The City of Vincent will disseminate and distribute letters, key ring torches/ cable locks and WA Police Crime Prevention Unit, with Perth, Wembley Police Stations identifying areas most vulnerable to burglaries and cocooning strategies to target such crime.

WA Police Crime Prevention Unit will disseminate remainder products to victims of home burglaries and vehicle crime

The City of Vincent, WA Police, Safer Vincent Crime Prevention Partnership and local media will create and disseminate awareness tips on securing property and vehicles.
