



GUIDELINES & COMMON QUESTIONS

DO I REQUIRE APPROVAL?

Yes. The proposed verge beautification design, including a list of plant species, should be submitted to the City's Parks Services section for approval prior to the commencement of any works.

PLANT SPECIES SELECTION

The selected plant species should not be prickly, have spines or be known to be poisonous or cause allergic reactions. We encourage the use of local native waterwise plants. Native Plant Sales are held in spring and autumn each year and all plants available are subsidised (residents only). Feel free to subscribe to our e-newsletters, like us on facebook or contact Parks Services to learn when these sales are on

Using local native plants provides significant benefits, including providing habitat for local fauna and beneficial insects. Local native plants have adapted over many years to tolerate and thrive in our harsh local conditions. The City recommends consulting the Grow Local Plants brochure for our West Coastal region. This brochure is available at the City's Administration and Civic Centre or Library or by visiting our streetscapes web page. Don't forget, you can always contact Parks Services with any queries.

LANDSCAPING FEATURES

No materials or structures such as fencing, raised planter beds, mounds, rocks, pea-gravel, brick rubble or stacked bricks are permitted on the verge as they may prevent safe pedestrian access. Incorporating paving into the design will be considered by the Engineering Design Services section.

FERTILISING

If required, slow release fertilisers are recommended for use on verge gardens. Slow release fertiliser is the most efficient form of fertiliser in Perth's sandy soils.

MULCHING

Mulching the verge is permitted and encouraged by the City. The type of mulch should be specified as part of the proposed design submitted to the City, however chunky mulches are preferred.

CHEMICALS

Weed, pest and disease control by chemical application should be limited. The City recommends that caution be taken if any chemicals are used to ensure the safety of pedestrians and nearby residents.

STREET VERGES



WHAT IS A STREET VERGE?

The verge is the area between the road, your property and the property next door. Please note that the verge is 'Crown Land' under the care, control and management of the Council.

WHO MAINTAINS THE STREET VERGE?

Generally, verges are the responsibility of the land owner or occupier and we strongly encourages residents and tenants to care for their verge in order to increase the aesthetics of their property and the street. However, the City does maintain all street verge trees and verges that form part of a 'streetscape' or 'greening' plan.

WHAT CAN BE PLANTED ON THE STREET VERGE?

Vegetation (excluding a Street Tree) may be planted on verges, such as groundcovers and small shrubs. However they must meet the criteria set by the City in the Verge Policy and be approved by the City's officers prior to planting/installation. The Verge Policy includes restrictions on height, plant species, reticulation and other factors

STREET TREES

A Street Tree is any tree that is planted on the verge. The City will select, plant, prune, remove and maintain all Street Trees to ensure appropriate care and uniformity within the streetscape. Please do not plant or prune any Street Trees on the verge. To request a street tree for your verge, please contact our Parks Services team.
