Whadjuk Noongar Country

Lake Monger Velodrome was used by Local Aboriginal people for gathering food, camping, meetings, and ceremonies. The area surrounding the lake is known as 'Gulup' (Place of Fire).

Dog Swamp holds Aboriginal Cultural Significance as it served as a camp, water source, quarry and is also connected to creation and dreaming stories.

Hyde Park was a camping, hunting and meeting place to source food, water and large paper bark trees used to make shelters.

Carr Street is a registered burial site, where skeletal remains have been uncovered.

Robertson Park holds Aboriginal Cultural Significance as a site for ceremonial activities, trade and gift exchanges, and marriage proposals.

Weld Square is a registered site of cultural significance, known as a traditional place for camping and gathering.

Stones Lake was a place of camping, hunting and ceremony.

The Derbarl Yerrigan has a strong mythical connection and provided fresh water and food.

The East Perth Power Station area is a place of great significance, with deep spiritual, mythological, and historical connections.
